## Editorial Comments - 50 years of Austineering

I honestly thought that I joined the club in 1976, but I see by my diary that I bought my first vintage Austin in July 1975. Sorry it was not a Seven, but a 1928 Austin 6 cylinder Sixteen/Six. I was only 19 going on 20 but knew that membership of a vintage car

club was essential. First I went to a meeting of one club and they told me that they would "need to consider my request for membership (i.e. did it have the right pedigree?)". One well known "Vintagent" even said to me, "what did I want to buy one of those blimmin' cars for?" (I think he thought I meant a later model from the 1940s!). Luckily I sat down next to a friendly tall gray haired gentleman and black framed glasses. He told me I would find the Austin 7 Register much more accepting for the owner of a uncommon model of Austin! The gentleman introduced himself as Pym Hills and told me he actually owned a Austin 12/4 himself! The rest is history as they say. The photo above of the Sixteen and and its little play mate was taken in 1978 three years later when I bought my first Seven, the famous "Porkchop", which turned out to be a much better proposition to get on the road. My progress on the old Sixteen was slow, so I sold it to another club member not long after. Finally I must give a big shout out to all those who have contributed to this newsletter, in particular, Robyn for the meeting minutes, Neil for the Events, and Neil, Karyn and Steve for their articles and photos.

## THE <u>LONG</u> DRIVE — The 3rd Edition - Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2025

For a few years I've taken advantage of the break between Christmas and New Year to go for a Long Drive. When I say "Long Drive" I mean far enough away from Brisbane that I have no idea how I'll get back if I suffer some sort of catastrophic breakdown.

In 2022 it was 378km to Warwick via Queen Mary Falls, returning via Ma Ma Creek and Rosewood. The 2023 edition was a touch shorter, a 245km run to Kilcoy via Mount Delaney and then along the west side of Lake Wivenhoe. This latest edition saw visit the location of Queensland's coldest temperature, Stanthorpe.

I'd planned on the 28<sup>th</sup> of December, but some work commitments and unfavourable weather forced me to instead pick the 2<sup>nd</sup> of January.

The day prior I spent time packing spares and getting ready. One task was pulling the dizzy out to check the connection to the dyno. Ever since I destroyed a dizzy to dyno gear due to lack of grease I've been a bit wary of this connection. It only takes 10 minutes to removed it, check it and retime the engine.

While the forecasted temperatures where comparatively low for summer it was still going to be a 30° day, so I wanted to get some distance between myself and home before the sun came up. I rolled out of the driveway at 3:40am and after 5km drove into a light shower, nothing serious but enough to make me reach for my broad brimmed hat. It was at that point that I discovered it wasn't in the car. After a returning home and waking the neighbours a second time I was off, but this time with a hat.

After traversing Colleges Crossing my first stop was at Peak Crossing, around 60km from home. A quick check showed that the car was fine, and the light rain was all but done. It was easy driving, and I wasn't pushing the 1929 A7 Meteor. I was



cruising along and not really paying attention to my notes and followed the directions toward Rathdowney. A bit of a mistake. For some reason I'd mixed up Rathdowney with Killarney and thus overshot my intended turn off by 10km! I considered altering my route and continuing that way but decided it was better to back track and go the way I'd planned.

There's a nice little creek where you turn off Carneys Creek Road on to Head Road so I pulled up for some breakfast. I guess I took around 20 minutes here, by the time I was back on the road I realised I hadn't seen another car for a least an hour. It's a good haul up the range to Teviot Falls Lookout, for my car it's mostly  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  gear but some of the pinches forced me into  $1^{st}$ .

Stopping next a Carr's Lookout I was surprised by a very well-dressed Japanese lady who wanted directions to Sydney. How she had ended up there was a mystery, and it was difficult to understand if she wanted to head east and drive down the coast or west to the inland route. In the end she headed west and I'm hoping she arrived ok.

With 30km to Stanthorpe I checked the fuel and decided that I'd make it with what remained in the tank so the spare 5l stayed in the jerry can. I was right but only just! As I drove through Stanthorpe the engine spluttered and wouldn't fire so I coasted the last 200m into the service station. Sure enough the tank was dry. Luckly, I keep the tank very clean so running it dry didn't result in sludge being draw in to the carburettor.

A few km's earlier my ignition light came on and quick checked confirmed there was no power in to or from the dyno. I spent 5 minutes prodding and poking the control panel but then decided it was no big deal, and I was sure there was sufficient power left in the battery to keep me going.

The only thing that really draws much power is the lights and I was hopeful they'd not be required again on this trip.

After a coffee and vanilla slice it was time to turn around and head home. The return was warmer but

APE 2-seater July 1936 to 1938; mechanically identical to the Ruby saloon also named the 'Opal'; 'square' rear body had good storage; exposed spare wheel; low frame; trafficators first fitted to scuttle then fitted to body behind doors, Ruby style radiator cowl and ventilators.



<u>AAK Open Road Tourer 4-seater 1934 - Aug 1936</u>; steel construction over ash frame; square doors; high frame; Ruby style radiator cowl and ventilators; vertical scuttle; exposed spare wheel on back panel.



<u>AAL Open Road Tourer 4-seater</u> Aug 1936 - Jan 1939; identical body to Ruby saloon with roof cut off; low frame; spare wheel covered; integral luggage rack; windscreen hinged on top rail. Later models had trafficators behind the doors.



ARQ Saloon Aug 1934 - Aug 1936; 'Ruby'. Completely restyled car; low frame; enc. radiator; toolbox under bonnet; steel construction over ash frame; enclosed spare wheel; standard sunshine roof; curved valance under front bumper; hinged rear windows



ARR Saloon Aug 1936 - Jan 1939; 'Ruby' 3 bearing engine; strengthened front pillars; greater slope to windscreen; waistline at rear widens and slopes down; rear quarter windows partly wind down. Cheaper, fixed

head version had no bumpers, detachable starting handle.



AC Cabriolet 1934 - 1936; 'Pearl'. Identical body to the Ruby; low frame; open top three position fold down hood; exposed hood irons; three cant rails to support hood - two after first 200 made



ACA Cabriolet 1936; 'Pearl' same specification as the ARR Ruby, now with fewer colour combinations; strengthened body; free of cross bars in space between cant bars; low frame. Body numbers continue to be same as chassis numbers



<u>AVK Van 1937-39</u> - Ruby styled with front body based on ARR; trafficators flush mounted; floor pan raised to provide flat carrying area; steel body

## MORE OF THE 'UMBLE A7 UTE

A wonderful older gentleman Bill Pearce approached me at my model train club early last month. He knew I was interested in old cars and wanted to share two photos of Austin 7s in his family. Both were lovely little roadster utilities. The first one is taken at Bowral and is promoting the "Jack and Jill Baby Shop" which was in the main business area in Bong Bong Street. I am not sure if Jack may have been one of the youthful drivers, but the driver is his Aunty. The second photo is of a similar ute. Both cars seem to be 1929 models. Jack kindly supplied the following story:-

#### The Life and Times of the Flying Tomato



The photo of Edna Wilson looking very pleased with her Austin A7 was taken in May 1944. It's in the backyard of the family home at Wiley Park, Sydney. How it acquired its name of The Flying Tomato is not remembered by the younger generation, perhaps it was red or green when purchased but the name helped give a sense of affection and ownership by all family members, especially the very young ones. Around this time Edna

Around this time Edna taught sewing at Taree High School. As relatives lived on

a farm at Wingham the little car may well have made a number of trips up there. By 1949 Edna purchased an acre at Burradoo and a baby ware shop in Bowral. The other photo, dated January 1949, shows the A7 at Belmore, Sydney with the shop name and a stork on the door, "Jack and Jill Baby

Shop", Bong Bong St Bowral. Like the engines on Thomas the Tank Engine this car was a really useful engine as it picked up the parcels for the shop each morning at the railway station and post office. And it too had a name!

Many trips were made between Bowral and Sydney during the 1950's, there is a photo somewhere of a brother-in-law rugged up in the back for the trip to Bowral as there was no room in the front, from memory the trip was 3 hours. The freezing return trip after dinner was to Moss Vale station to catch an express to Sydney.

Newer cars were bought, and The Flying Tomato was retired to a shed at Colo Vale, a move from Burradoo made in the mid to late 1950's. Sadly, around 1960 the A7 was badly burned in a fire, possibly a short but it was kept in the shed. During the 1960's a chap at Yerrinbool was given the engine and gearbox and they powered a table saw.

Before Edna's death in 1974 the engine and gearbox were returned and they, along with the chassis, resided in the garage of a niece in Kiama Downs, her husband hoping to restore it. This was not to be and many years later the Flying Tomato, chassis, motor and gearbox was given to a vintage car enthusiast at Albion Park NSW. What has become of them is a mystery.

it into a van and at the same time provide extra advertising area". Price is a very reasonable 6,950 UKPs. Well Eddie hoping to make a replica of one of these little vehicles and is chasing the remains of a 1932 -34 saloon, so if you should have the remains of one cluttering up the shed, please contact Eddie (details are in the membership book.)

Seeing Eddie's photo it reminded me of a photo I had seen of a Model A Ford. I soon found this photo. The book described it as a "Huckster" style, although it was advertised originally as an "Express Delivery". Features include the fresh fruit display and grocers' scales which are an optional extra!


