Some very sad news, we have lost another of our long term and founder members, Barry Neville, he passed away peacefully on the

24th of July. Barry is best known for his two cars, Alice Mk I, a Sports very quick home-made special by the windscreen. Alice's first rally was to Lismore with

the VCCQ in Sept 62. Barry was very active with first the VCCQ, the QVVA and our own Austin 7 Register from the earliest days and served as our President in 1977 to 1978. "Baz" was quite a character and most older members would have their favourite story to tell. Barry also worked at UQ in the Materials Testing Laboratory.

Here is a nice tribute from Terry Hicks, another very active former member.

"Hi Tim, Yes you are correct about Barry being an important member of the club, as President of the club it was a pleasure to attend his meetings all flowed well and was always to the point they never waffled on and addressed what was needed to be discussed

Barry probably did more to promote the Austin 7 club in the early days than most others in the fact That he was always out and about in "Alice Mk.1" it was his one and only car and was distinctive in the paintwork Grey and Red and of course the Gentleman's Umbrella always at the ready strapped to the side of the car I remember one Saturday when riding in a Tram on Ipswich Road near Annerley junction the tram overtook Alice Going uphill.

Barry being Barry was out the side of "Alice Mk.1" with his arm making like he was on a surfboard and paddling away up hill. Laughter a plenty from the people on that packed tram that day.

Many times, I saw "Alice " and the Vintage Car club outings rubbing noses with PG's Bentley or a Vauxhall.



On many of their Rallies the larger cars in trouble well "Alice" was the first to stop to help. (The photo left shows "PG" Woodhouse's Bentley, Alice Mk. 1 and Nev Doherty's Mathis Nev thinks this was the park opposite the old Petrie paper mill at the start of a weekend Rally to Noosa in the early 1960s.)

I was there the Day "Alice Mk.2 " was discovered and so began another chapter in Barry's life. All great days and fond memories.

Most member thought that Barry would always be a swinging single as on most rallies it was Barry on his own no Lady Friends were evident then one day out of the blue came "Mollie"

Wow! Made in England of course She had to be to be in the running to be competition for "Alice" and what a treasure she was to Barry

They went on to raise a lovely family and was there in his hour of need.

These are just some of the memories I have at this time of a fond and great friend and a TRUE AUSTIN 7 Member!"

"Thanks Tim. My everlasting memory of Barry is in his white overalls as the QVVA Rally Organiser in the club's early years. Planning and supervising great runs when traffic was thinner, and our old cars could stop and we could look for answers to questions without problems or bothering other motorists. Not so today. He planned imaginative and interesting routes calling for varied navigation skills. A great worker and member of the QVVA and I know the same can be said for the A7 Register." *Nev Doherty QVVA and VCCQ member.*

Tributes to the Memorable MONTY SCHOFIELD

We pay tribute to another great club member; Monty was a much-liked member of the Register for many years. Here some tributes to him from the recent Vintage Car Club Magazine, (thank you Peter and Jenni) – Tim

"Solution and the started a long association with A7s because of the little car *(by then known as "Chocolate Monty*"

)...About this time, Monty acquired a 14HP Minerva and carried out a stunning restoration. The ex-French Railton was the next project followed by a Talbot 105. I had started this restoration and had imported a 105 Team Car body frame. Monty completed the restoration, and the car is now owned by son, Jason. "Fat Bob" was next on the scene and this P1 RR Roadster was enjoyed by Monty and Rita for many years. Always generous with their hospitality, I remember a wine bottling night in their back yard at Arthur Street, it was a drinkable red and the night was rolling along nicely. Colin Ruffell was in charge of sales, and it was \$6 a bottle or 3 for \$20. We all availed ourselves of the bargain offer! Before the Wolseley Hornet Special period in Monty's life, a veteran Alldays & Onions arrived at Arthur St. Sadly it has never been completed but is just a whisker off a start. Hornets were the last motoring venture although a stunning BSA Goldstar did materialize in the back shed over a period of a couple of years. Steam projects punctuated his motoring and the traction engine he restored while working at the Queensland Museum, and the steam yacht that he and Dale Hanley created, were works of art. Sadly, Monty's final days were spent in care in New Farm where Rita now resides. Condolences to Rita, Jason, Sue and families. It was an honour to have known him." - *Joe Wilson*

"A creation that Joe didn't mention was Mighty Mouse, the Austin 7 monoposto racer. Monty was never going to use it in competition - he was too big for it! When it came time to sell a prospective buyer was dithering and Monty was getting cranky. One evening I was having dinner and the odd glass of wine in a nice little restaurant with the Schofields and Hawthorne's when Monty announced that he would sell MM for \$1000 off the asking price just to upset off the other joker". *John Wagstaff*

"It is said that people live on in our memories----I can clearly hear Monty's dulcet tones as I write this.. Dear Olde Monty, I shall miss him------BUT I still can HEAR him. That rich baritone voice"- --Jak Guymar

"Kev Long reminded us of the story that Monty might have trotted out more than once. Years ago Monty went to work at the Queensland Museum, with responsibility for restoration, maintenance and operation of all things mechanical. Monty dressed then as we knew him in the Doggett's Cottage shed; boots and dirty sleeveless overalls. The job was fine and his work output impressive, but something wasn't quite right. It's lunchtime at the museum and there's a gasp as Monty walks into the lunchroom, plonks his lunch on the table and climbs up on a chair. "I'm Monty Schofield. I've been working here for eight months and in that time not one of you have said g'day to me. Because I wear dirty work clothes and there's grease under my fingernails you think I'm beneath you; you look down your noses at me. "Let me tell you something. When I take on a project downstairs the result is that it works, whether it's a windmill, tractor or steam engine. It works! Now, when your (stuffed) kangaroos and birds can hop and fly, that's when you can look down your noses." Lunch was taken without another word. And for a considerable time the most used greeting at the museum was "G'day Monty"". - David Monckton."

Ânother, final, Monty story - back in the late 80s, there was a rascally gent by the name of Roy Gibson in Gympie, who had a collection of cars for sale, including an early 1930s A7 Ute that Monty was going to buy from him, one way or another. Roy kept prevaricating about the price and if he would sell it to Monty at all, while Monty just kept on putting \$50 notes on the footpath till Roy was forced to finally capitulate!

The club received this nice letter from Mike and Kathy McGuill who have been members for more years than many can remember, but decided it is time for them to resign,

"After 38 years of membership with the A7 Register of Qld we have decided not to renew our membership.
