A Presidential Postscript - Please Consider

Hi Members,

Those of you who were able to attend our AGM earlier in the month will already know but, for those who couldn't attend, I'd like to advise that John Que has declined a nomination to continue as our Treasurer. John has been a faithful servant of the club for many years but at this stage he'd like to hand the role over to someone else. He has worked hard over the last period to ensure that all the documentation is in order and ready for a new member to step in to the role. So who will it be?

Clubs rely on members to fulfil these positions and while they do take some effort they are in fact very rewarding. The role of Treasurer is to inform the Committee and the wider membership of the clubs financial affairs. The Treasurer has day to day oversight of the bank account and ensures that payments are made in accordance with our constitution and revenues are correctly accounted for. The club uses a common accounting software package called MYOB to manage the process. No previous experience is necessary, a willingness to learn and an hour or two a week is all that it takes.

A common misconception is that the Treasurer is personally responsible for the clubs finances but this is incorrect, the Treasurer works in accordance with rules set out in the constitution and all their decisions are ratified by the committee and in terms of expenditure at least one other member of the Committee must approve any payment.

So the question is, are you the next Treasurer? We do need to fill the role and ideally it would be with a member who can attend most of our monthly meetings. A working understanding of basic accounting would be great but it is certainly not a necessity. If you'd like to nominate or even just have a chat about the role please don't hesitate to call me on the number below.

> AUSTIN TWELVE, 12/4.1922-39 (prod: 69,444 to end 1930). Motor: Side valve four cylinder l660cc 20bhp at 2000rpm, single plate clutch, four speed gate change gearbox with central change, helical bevel axle, semielliptic suspension. Announced (briefly as the Ten) and launched in late 1921 with a five-bearing crank like the Twenty, the Twelve proved to be a virtually indestructible car and had an extended lease of life as a London taxi in the 1930s, a further 15,000 12/4s of all types being sold after 1930.

#376 Campbell an # 377 Mia Guthrie of Hollywell are Rhonda and Ross Guthrie's grandchildren and have been learning to drive the family 1929 Saloon and 1937 Tourer on a Veteran Car Club country tour at Kingarov

#378 Murray & Fiona Rix of Southport have a restored green 1934 Austin 7 Sports, be exciting to see what that one looks like

NATIONAL AUSTIN SEVEN RALLY EXPLAINED. from Wayne Styles

Austin Seven vehicles and their owners are constantly changing and I am aware that a significant number of the owners have joined the movement during the past 5 years. There are approximately 600 owners and 1500 'sevens' in Australia and many more under restoration. It is anticipated that 10% of them will be present at the forthcoming 100th anniversary rally to be held in Warrnambool in 2022, but how did it all start?

Four Austin Seven folk drove from Victoria to spectate at the 1989 Adelaide AGP, during the journey one of the travellers floated a long time idea off the others about organising a major event that would interest the 4 larger Austin Seven clubs in getting together possibly somewhere central like Wagga Wagga etc and to make it a long weekend event.

This was not an entirely new idea as the Victorian and South Australian clubs had been sharing a social weekend event annually since the 1950's, but not a rally.

The new concept was to organise a major national Austin Seven rally to celebrate the forthcoming 70th anniversary of the marque in 1992.

Upon returning from the AGP the idea was presented to the Victorian club for consideration and approval, a sub committee was formed to make it happen who subsequently contacted the NSW club who joined the fray and the a decision was made to jointly organise the event in Canberra. (photo above shows the Qld. contingent at the 1992 Rally)

The event was a major success being supported by all the clubs and a decision was made to accept an offer from the Queensland Austin Seven register to organise another rally to celebrate the 75th anniversary in Maroochydore in 1997 which was to become the practice on a 5 yearly basis ever since.

As a result of the first rally in Canberra where the spare parts managers held their first meeting a cooperation of spare parts trading has flourished between clubs to this day plus a number of long standing friendships from Austin Seven people.

A7 REG. QLD ANNUAL WEEKEND 10th & 11th September 2021

Our Annual Weekend, postponed from August due to COVID lockdowns, finally came around this year on 10th & 11th September. It was decided that we would go ahead with our Monthly Meeting followed by the AGM on the Friday evening, and combine a Lunch and Static Display of our A7s at the Carindale Clubrooms on the Saturday. Our AGM on Friday night proceeded without a hitch, with all previous A7 Reg. Qld

being presented with Life Membership of the Club – a privilege and a huge honour (and a well-kept secret) bestowed upon me by President Steve on behalf of the Committee, following nomination by the McGuills. Several September birthdays were also celebrated on the evening, the photos of which are on our A7 Website.

On Saturday, glorious Queensland weather greeted us for our muchanticipated and event-filled day.

Assembling in the carpark adjoining the Club's BBQ area was an impressive line-up of 12.5 Austin 7s. The 0.5 Austin was the mounted gleaming engine block etc. from President Steve's A7 – a repair job in progress with the car body laying in wait at Fig Tree Pocket.

Other members arriving in their Austins were Lindsay (joined by Sharon), Doug & Robyn, Trevor & Elaine, Neil (joined by



Karyn), Ian & Valda, Brett (joined by Kylie, Clare & Tessa), Ross & Rhonda, Hugh & Judy, Russell & Vanda & 'Louie', Justin McK., Ian & Jared, and Peter & Nell. A stand-out in this group of A7s was the home built 1928 'Dorman Special' standing proudly at the head of the pack. These members were joined by around another 19 more members driving their modern cars. A notable omission at this year's event was ex-Librarian Alan, who was resting up after having a pacemaker installed the previous day.

At around 11.30am, as the sun rose overhead in the cloudless sky, the BBQs were lit and the hot plate was soon laden with sausages, meat patties, bacon and onions to feed the impressive (and hungry) number of

Back in 2016 Ted Bale's daughter Stacy and son-in-law Jamie Curtiss purchased John Perham's 1937 Ruby as a running restoration. Originally it belonged to Trevor



Ford, who bought the car from the original owner's family. Ted and family borrowed my trailer and we went to bring the car back from Glenwood, which is up past Gympie. The motor was running and most of the panels primed, but there was still a lot to do as investigation showed some long ago repairs due to a shunt up the back end of the little Ruby that needed doing as the rear mudguards and body did not match up properly. With Teds welding and metal working expertise and Jamie's attention to detail and many hours spent sanding and filling the panels, the long hours are paying off. Jamie

was able to source some very good tradesmen around Burpengary and Caboolture to do the final painting, upholstery and chrome work. Most of the car was there but small items like park lights and door handles were missing or in poor condition, and Ted was able to source many parts from the UK and "Trevor's Technically True and Tested New Parts Shed". Ted also used a pair of Ruby rear guards from "Dougie 's Den of Dented but Dependable Used A7 Parts" to replace ropey bits on the original rear guard where it had been trimmed off and welded roughly many years ago.



On the right is a photo of young lads Ethan and Jayden with their new car 5 years ago, both they and the car have progressed since then!!

Now the car is nearing completion, only need to fit the set of repaired dish type Ruby hubcaps, and install the missing roof centre. Here again Ted was able to find a UK supplier who makes the timber pieces for the Rubies roof as a kit. The family made their own minds up as to what colour the trim and paint should be, and I think it works well on a small car like this. The final paint was applied by a spray painter who came to their house and did all the work in the larger 4 berth shed on a very, very hot day over last summer. The colour is called Californian Sage, a very light metallic with a touch of green, used on contemporary Aston Martin's. Hopefully we will see the Ruby and its garage companion "Little Miss" out on a tour soon!
